# 2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

A mentors work is very wide ranging particularly in college where a teacher is besides teacher she or he is friend, guide and to an extent have parental role. Students in higher education are involved in wide varieties of activities and most of the graduate class students take active part in extracurricular activities. These activities are looked after by teacher or group of teachers. These Teachers act as their mentors and provide necessary support to students. Two massive organized activities are NSS, NCC and other fragmented activities are sports and games and cultural activities. Graduate students actively participate in these and for considerable duration they work under the guidance of teachers, these activities provide excellent opportunities to all concerned to closely interact. Thus a very effective system of mentoring is in existence in the campus. For post- graduate students, mentoring system is more vibrant as their activities are restricted in departments only thus has ample opportunity to work and discuss issues with faculty members more frequently and at length. Students also interact with the faculties when they are in Long or short tours undertaken by the departments owing to fulfill academic commitments. Research Scholars work under a guide or supervisor, here we have closest interactions between the scholars and his or her guides in a mutually supportive manners. Both fulfill their commitments effectively. The mentoring system is very effective for entire under graduate first semester and a significant part of the post graduate students who are taking admission first time as they are new to college culture. Students from rural area needed special attention as they come from remote region where development is yet to take place they do

face language problems and adjustment problems in new social milieu, they were not only supported by the mentors but also by students representatives. Students from rural area face real difficulty in adjustment.

2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

As affiliated to Ch. Devi Lal University, Sirsa the institution follows the evaluation system implemented by the University. The evaluation reforms are intimated by the University well in advance before their implementation and are put in to action by the college as per the instructions. The institute adheres to the guidelines of Ch. Devi Lal University, Sirsa for internal evaluation which includes regular attendance, assignments and examination. • Continuous evaluation through different methods like internal assessment test, assignments, presentations, quiz contests, etc. • Transparency is maintained in evaluation process. Table marking of university exam answer books is in place. • The practical examination is conducted with internal and external examiners appointed by the affiliating university. • Exams are conducted by the affiliating university and answer books are evaluated by the external examiners appointed by the university. But 20 to 30 marks have been fixed for internal assessment of the students which are awarded on the basis of assignments, class tests and attendance. • To ensure regulars attendance of students, rules regarding systematic leave, name struck off and readmission procedure are notified to students initially during orientation program and reinforced in mentor-mentee meet. Regular absentee slips are filled by every teacher and in the end of every semester, fine is calculated by the committee and students have to deposit that amount which in turn acts as a measure to reduce absenteeism. Students who remain absent for 6 continuous working days or for 15 days in a month, their names are struck off same. Such students are given a chance for readmission within 15 days with a fine.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The institution adheres to the Academic Calendar for the conduct of CIE. The college is affiliated to Ch.Devi Lal University, Sirsa and the pattern prescribed by the university is strictly followed. o In the beginning of each academic year, it is published by the University for undergraduate as well as post graduate courses. It specifies the date of commencement and end of the classes for each semester along with the holidays. o Keeping in view the schedule set by the university, college follow various methods to carry out a continuous internal evaluation system at the institutional level. o The Principal and the HOD decide the dates for other academic activities like seminars, sports fest, cultural fests, etc. o Time to time staff meetings are also conducted to ensure effective time management .Time table is prepared department wise and approved by the HOD. It is displayed on the college notice board is allotted to all the concerned teachers. o Following the timetable allotted, every teacher prepares lesson plans to ensure timely delivery of syllabus. These are also displayed on the college website and on notice board. o The institution adopts various steps for evaluating the students by conducting regular class tests, quiz, presentations, assignments etc. o The CIE system for the students is as follows: o Two assignments are given to the students in each semester. The time for each assignment is decided well in advance usually one in the 2nd month of beginning of each semester and the other one month later. Attendance of student is also considered. The college's internal assessment committee ensures timely preparation of internal assessment of the students so that it can be submitted to the university within stipulated timeframe. o University cell issues roll slips to the students for external examination well in time. o In case of any change, the university intimates the same to the college and the college enforces the same. In any condition, the academic calendar is followed and respected by the teachers of all departments. Therefore the college has an excellent work culture and it seldom faces difficulty in completing the curriculum well in time.

## 7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Title of practice: Cleanliness of Campus and Use of Technology Goals: • To promote use of computer technology and lesser use of paper • To promote use of technology to increase transparency, administrative efficiency and academic effectiveness • To promote cleanliness in campus • To create ideal ambience for education. Context: Clean and hygienic environment is basic component of decent living. Swach Bharat Abhiyan has put focus on cleanliness as a vital indicator of a healthy and civilized society. The college is committed to creating healthy environment and positive ambience for teaching learning process. Cleanliness and environment consciousness are the primary values that students need to imbibe as students as well as responsible members of community. Govt. National College, Sirsa is the biggest college of the district. Manual processes of student admission, fee submission and financial transactions involve lot of paper work. It is a cumbersome and time consuming process to keep records of the student, staff, college infrastructure, and academic activities and track the information quickly whenever needed. Use of technology can transform both academic and administrative aspects of the HEI. Use of technology can help in promoting cleaner and greener environment by reducing use of paper. The Practice: This campus of our college is spread over large area of 18 acres. A large number of class IV employees clean the campus on daily basis. Apart from this six NSS units of students lead the college in cleanliness drive. College took many initiatives to spread the message of Swatchta Abhiyan and make students aware of the significance cleanliness. 250 students participated in a cleanliness drive undertaken by different units of NSS. NSS volunteers organised a massive rally as part of national campaign of Swatchta Abiyan to make the community aware of the importance of clean and

hygienic environment. Different NSS units of the college take the responsibility of maintaining cleanliness of different areas of the college. Clean environment does not only mean maintaining basic sanitation but also an environment that is pollution free. Clean campus is undoubtedly green campus. Tree plantation is a regular activity. The NSS volunteers and NCC cadets take care of the plants and trees in area allotted to them. The college continued its efforts in the direction of promoting use of technology. A well equipped, air conditioned Commerce Computer Lab with LAN of 22 computers was established. The college staff and other students also volunteer for cleanliness drives and tree plantation. The teachers on proctorial duties ensure that students follow the cleanliness norms of the college. Different cells and societies organise various programmes to instil a sense of belongingness to their environment and to encourage them to adopt habits that help in keeping the campus clean and green. Evidence of Success The students and the staff voluntarily and enthusiastically participated in the cleanliness and plantation drives. The level of cleanliness of the college has considerably improved. There is a perceptible change in the conduct of the students as they are actively participating in maintaining the cleanliness of the campus. There is a visible change in the behaviour of the students as there is litter reduction and increased use of dustbins. The college has been able to maintain its green cover in spite of increased constructed area. Use of computers has increased for office work. Process of digitalization has improved the level of transparency of the system, access to information and efficiency of delivery of administrative tasks. . Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The digital literacy among the students is very low. The availability of ICT infrastructure is not enough to make ICT an integral part of classroom teaching. The college needs to invest more in IT infrastructure and training

programs for students and the staff. There should be ICT and digital training programs for teaching and non- staff of the college to increase digital literacy and develop their ICT capacity Title of the practice: Making Students Socially Conscientious: • To sensitize the students towards the difficulties faced by the socially backward sections of the society. • To make the students able to set examples before the masses in the field of social service and nation building. • Sensitizing the youth to the social and environmental issues and motivate them to work for protection of environment, eradication of illiteracy and disease • To inculcate the culture of sharing social responsibilities among the students. Context: Our vision is to produce generations of positive, practical, dedicated, and passionate future leaders who can transform the society and the nation. Young people can empower communities if they participate in community awareness and development programs. The college is committed to contributing to the task of social transformation and nation building by inculcating a sense of social responsibility and community engagement. The vision of egalitarian and equitable society cannot be realized only through framing laws. Many welfare schemes fail to achieve desired goals because of lack of awareness amongst the disadvantaged sections of society. As the students are also part of the local community they can become effective agents for spreading information, raising awareness and bringing change. The Practice: The college works at various levels to generate awareness amongst students and foster the spirit of community service. The college organizes a range of extension activities through forums like NSS, NCC, Women Cell, Subject Societies etc. organize programmes to sensitize students towards problems and needs of the of the underprivileged and the marginalized sections of the society. There are six NSS units - four units of boys and two units of girls. Each unit has more than 100 volunteers. In the beginning of each session, students are enrolled for the social work and national service. Then they are oriented to execute the plans for that particular year and the thrust area. Each unit adopts one slum area/ village for the year and, in consultation with the local authorities, tries to convert it into a model one. The volunteers interact with the community members of the area adopted by them. The volunteers identify and analyse their problems and help the people of the area to find solutions. During seven-day camp students live together and cook, serve and eat without any consideration of gender, caste, community, class, and creed giving rise to communal harmony. It inculcates a sense of social responsibility and mutual adjustment so that they can adapt themselves to any surrounding/circumstances. Students of GNC Sirsa took oath to obey road safety rules-05/04/2018 Evidence of Success Various activities organized and practices adopted by the college to Students Socially Conscientious have been successful in their endeavour. The college has not only been able to sensitize its volunteers and other students about the need and nature of social work but has been successful in reaching out to the local community. The activities

raised the level of awareness among the students. They became more observant of their physical and social environment. They also developed a sense of belongingness to their surroundings. Their experience with the community made them more empathetic towards problems of others and more receptive to diverse opinions. Owing to the efforts of the NSS volunteers the level of cleanliness increased in the areas adopted by them. They were also able to raise consciousness about different social issues. The activities had a positive impact on the personality of the students. The students had the practical experience of working with the people. This experience improved their communication skills and problem solving capacity. They learn to work in harmony and developed leadership qualities. The process also made them realize that they have ability to bring change. Problems encountered and resources required Being a Government institution, the college has financial constraints as many of the extension activities require financial support. Collaboration with local philanthropists and NGOs can help in mobilizing the resources for extension activities. The students are not able to spend as much time they would like to spend on extension activities owing to tight academic schedule.

#### 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

The college is the oldest institution of higher learning of the area. The college has been serving the academic needs of the region since its inception in 5th February 1957. The college is situated in the heart of Sirsa city just opposite to the main bus stand. The college campus is 700 metres from the railway station of the city and 900 metres away from the affiliating university Chaudhary Devi Lal University, Sirsa. Thus, the rail and road connectivity of the city makes the college accessible not only to the students of rural and semi-urban areas of the Sirsa district but also of the college come from geographically, culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds. The demography of the college comprises of students from diverse social and economic groups. The focus of the college is that no aspirant of higher education is deprived of education because of geographical, social or economic constraints. The affordable fee structure ensures accessibility of education to all. Being a government institution, the college offers many scholarships for

meritorious students and for the students from socially and economically backward sections of society. The college offers institutional support to the needy students through various schemes. The fact that the number of students from socially backward sections exceeds the number of seats reserved for them is indicative of the social and economic inclusiveness of the college. A large section of students has to travel daily. Higher spending on transportation means lower access to higher education. The college collaborates with Haryana Transport Department to ensure that the students get bus passes at subsidized rate so that they can afford to commute and attend college. Bus passes for the girl students are free of cost. The college also has a Girls' Hostel that provides accommodation at affordable rates to the girl students belonging to remote places with poor transport connectivity. The college runs in two shifts: morning and evening. Evening shift makes undergraduate courses accessible to those students who work in order to earn and cannot attend college during regular hours. Majority of the students are from rural background or from socially and economically disadvantaged sections of society. Most of them are first generation students of higher education. The mission of the college is to

create a supportive ecosystem that appreciates diversity, stimulates curiosity
 and nurtures creativity. The college has distinction of having oldest post
 graduate departments in the district. The college offers postgraduate courses
 in eight subjects. Accessible and affordable education does not imply
 compromising quality. All endeavours of the college are directed in the
 direction of providing quality education. The college has well qualified staff,
 spacious campus and modern infrastructure. Various cells, societies and
 committees of the college organize competitions, lectures and workshops for the
 students to hone their talent and skills. Students of the college have shown
 remarkable success not only in academics but in the field of cultural
